The theme- "Getting the Job Done - You Can Do It," is meant to be practical, with down to earth educational sessions. Each session will have a Take Away, a useful tool that all attendees will be able to put to use, upon their return home, while performing their daily tasks.

The educational program consists of the following Tracks: I. Operation and Maintenance II. New Facility Systems III. Design, Construction &

Administration IV. Sustainability Scheduled in between the educational sessions, a well laid out exhibit area will be fully occupied by many of our Business Partners. Here again service and equipment suppliers will be standing ready for the opportunity to learn how they may assist you in meeting your institutions needs.

This building has many sustainable design features including a displacement ventilation system and a geo-thermal heating system.

The program has been designed to address many of your daily work tasks. The Host Committees desire is to assist attendees to acquire knowledge that will improve productivity and organization skills while assisting in making our workloads more manageable, and our world more sustainable. As always this Conference will be another great opportunity to share and learn from your fellow facilities professionals.

Seeking the Leader In Each of Us

I have been involved in Facilities Management for more that a few years, and in a leadership position for most of that time. For a time in my earlier years, I had assumed that good leaders were born, not made. I have been fortunate to be around colleagues at both Phillips Exeter and within the APPA organization who I would describe as having a natural leadership style, and I believe that I have learned something from them. But few of us could boast that we are the best that we can be.

"The Leadership Academy is designed for those individuals with a desire to lead individually, organizationally and professionally. In a changing environment, an organization's success depends on the staff's ability to embrace new roles, new ways of doing things, and new skills." This description, taken from the APPA web site, in a nutshell, describes one of APPA's successful educational opportunities. The three levels: individual, organizational, and professional, are addressed in the program's three tracks, each one week long:

 \sum Track I: Individual Effectiveness Skills This track helps you examine your own personal leadership skills. It is centered on Franklin Covey's various leadership methods and tools to strengthen your own leadership abilities. It includes a 360-degree peer profile to give you an understanding of your leadership strengths and areas to target for improvement.

 \sum Track II: Organizational Leadership Skills In this track, the leadership perspective widens to examine the essential role of teamwork in leading the organization.

 Σ Track III: Professional Leadership Skills Skills gained here will help participants to understand and appreciate the constraints, requirements, and goals of their institution, translate this information into a meaningful strategy that supports the academic mission, and communicate this strategy in effective ways.

I had the opportunity to attend the first track of the Leadership Academy in June of 2004. Ours was in one of the larger classes- we had about forty people from all levels of facilities, and from all over the country. I had heard that APPA was encouraging its future leaders to go through the Leadership Academy. Sure enough, Ed Rice, who became president of APPA the following month, graduated from the 3rd track last June. President elect Jack Colby was in my session. Over the weeklong period, we were lead by Gary Reynolds and Maggie Kinneman through exercises in self-discovery, and became familiar with the skills needed to become not just more effective leaders, but more effective people. Even though our class was large, the

smaller, round table format, with daily musical chairs-like changes in group arrangements, helped each of us become an interactive part of the larger whole, giving truth to the saying "we are all in this together". I left at the end of the week feeling transformed in a way that I had not expected.

APPA encourages those attending the Academy to follow the three tracks in order. "This immersion approach is designed to foster the development of strong professional relationships among participants." I look forward to continuing with the remaining two tracks of the Leadership Academy, with many of the same people. We will meet again at the next scheduled session on June 19-23, 2005 in Las Vegas, Nevada.

As a side note, APPA has begun to offer a 2nd opportunity to attend session one of the Leadership Academy. This alternate session schedule was held for the first time, co-located at the January 2005 Institute for Facilities Management in San Jose, California. The intent is to continue to offer this first track side by side with future

- Σ Developed a set of Educational Program Standards and Guidelines for Host Committees.
- Σ Have established a working group to hopefully delineate successful strategies and approaches that can be taken to offer educational programs in differing formats (ie. Experience exchange).
- Σ Has continued to update the Chapter "Process Book" (Anita Bailey)
- ∑ Continuation to coordinate January and June Education Committee/Host Committee meetings to review, advise, and assist Host Committee conference planning.
- Σ Participation annually in ERAPPA Education Committee meetings and as education liaison between Region and Chapter.
- Σ Established the acceptable use for, annual division of, and process for obtaining Partners In Education funds.
- Σ Working with Technology Committee to establish Educational Program Databank as repository of offered educational programs for Host Committees and member institutions.
- Σ Working with Membership and Business Partner Liason Committees to develop a jointly presented first-time attendees program.

Planned Future Activity

A summary of planned activity and issues for future discussion include the following:

- Σ Establishment of the educational program "databank".

, Include a retired members news section in the Chapter Newsletter , Provide opportunities for retired members to continue service with the Chapter on committees.


